School has purchased specialist equipment or resources when necessary.

Staff seek advice and observe practise at The Grove special school when needed and Grove staff have supported in school.</p>
16	Which external agencies and support agencies are the school working with and how well is this working?	<p>LA High Needs Intervention Team, EWO, Educational Psychologist Speech and Language support Health agencies- Occupational and physiotherapists, Health Visitors, Speech and Language Therapists, School Nursing service. The school has made 32 referrals in total to outside agencies for support 2023/24</p>
17	What communication strategies are in place for parents/carers of children with SEND?	<p>Daily links with class teachers Termly contact with SENDco if necessary</p>
18	What is going well?	<p>Provision for children medical and physical needs. 1:1 provision. SEN TA's running interventions throughout the school in the afternoons and supporting in class during the mornings has had an impact in the attainment of children with additional needs. Links with nurseries to provide training. Range of training accessed this year. Links with The Grove Special School. Additional member of staff trained for SENDco qualification and supporting SENDco with completing paperwork. Development of links with NHS Speech and Language service. Provision of parent workshops.</p>
19	What is going less well and needs to be improved?	<p>Enhance provision for speech and language development due to the rapid expansion of need in this area. Continue the work to redesign the internal space to effectively meet the needs of children with SEND.</p>
